Message from the Principal

At the beginning of this year, Sacré Cœur proudly launched its Strategic Plan for 2017-2020. Our vision statement, 'Sacré Cœur Women Shape the World' is both inspirational and aspirational. Our young women are among the most privileged in our country, and in our world. We encourage our girls to realise their gifts and we ask that they share their talents with others.

Janet Erskine Stuart's educational philosophy also encourages students to find their mission or purpose in life. She said, 'We must remember that each one of our children is destined for a mission in life. Neither we, nor they, can know what it is, but we must know and make them believe that each one has a mission in life and she is bound to find out what it is; some place in life which no one else can fill.'

One of the initiatives in the Strategic Plan is to research and equip our young women with a contemporary education. An education that will provide them with the necessary skills and attributes for a changing world of work. We also need to teach the girls compassion so they can take their place in our globalised world. Our young women will need to model and embrace divergent thinking and cultural understanding if they are to thrive in a globalised world.

In early June, we hosted a Sacred Heart Conference bringing together the Principals, Board Chairs and some staff from our ANZNET Region. We welcomed our colleagues from Baradene College, Auckland; Kincoppal-Rose Bay, New South Wales and Stuartholme School, Queensland. We also welcomed our Provincial, Sr Lynette Toohey RSCJ and our keynote speaker was Dr Ann Marie Krejcarek, Principal of Convent and Stuart Hall, Schools of the Sacred Heart in San Francisco.

We learnt from Ann Marie's experience and leadership how she has embedded both programs and experiences for the students in her school to develop global thinking skills.

We are very fortunate to belong to our International Sacred Heart Network. We already benefit from linking to our Sister School at Forest Ridge, School of the Sacred Heart, Washington, at Year 9 and Year 10. The girls in Year 12 also connect with the RSCJ programs offered through Sophie's Farm in the Philippines. However, there is much more we can do and our vision statement asks us to be at the forefront of this educational development.

It is a wonderful time to educate our young women. We are delighted to make use of our International Sacred Heart family as we learn from each other.

We look forward to sharing our initiatives with you as we continue to raise and educate globally minded citizens.

This edition of the 'Burke Road Bulletin' showcases some major events and celebrations of learning over our first Semester. Our Focus Goal, which celebrates a deep respect for intellectual values, is truly reflected in our approach to our learning at Burke Road.

From the Sacré Cœur Board

It has been an exciting and challenging few months for the School, as we embrace change and look to the future across many aspects of our Sacré Cœur world.

We said farewell to our outgoing Chair, Wendy Graham, and thanked her for her many years of sterling service to the School. We also farewelled Rosie Mullaly and Stephanie Quinn, who stepped down from their roles on the Board at the end of 2016. All three women demonstrated throughout their service to the School all the best attributes of talented, capable women, freely committing their time and expertise to the School and our community, to its enormous benefit.

I assumed the role as Chair of the Board in January and had the unhappy duty to inform the School community in February that this would be Maureen Ryan's last year with us as our Principal. Our loss is our sister school's gain at Kincoppal-Rose Bay. Whilst we are very sad to lose the wonderful leadership, wise management and warm engagement that Maureen brings to her work, we are thankful that she will remain within the Sacred Heart family of schools in Australia.

The Board has spent the past several weeks working on a robust recruitment process to find a new Principal for Sacré Cœur. It is in some ways a daunting task but we have consulted widely within our community and we are clear about the skills, experience and attributes we are seeking. The search is underway. We have a strong panel of selectors made up of Board members and some external

independent education experts. As we accept the task and the work ahead, we are mindful of St Madeleine Sophie Barat's wise counsel on change – "Before making any changes take counsel...Prudence and a wise slowness are necessary in the beginning". I will, of course, keep the community informed of our progress.

After months of research and consultation, the School also announced its new uniform design and the community responded with approval and great excitement, especially from the students.

We also recently completed the car park project, which commenced last year. Landscaping and tree planting will be completed in the next few weeks. The car park will allow us to use the land at the back of the School more effectively and we will start the next building project in due course. The new tennis/netball/ basketball courts are also a very welcome facility for the sporting life of the School. The School is deeply indebted to the Board Director, John Loschiavo, whose oversight of the project on behalf of the Board was crucial to its success. John demonstrated great energy and diligence in his leadership of this significant project, just as he did in 2016 when he managed the new roof project on behalf of the School. His great construction management skills and his wise and gentle counsel across all matters on the Board



will be greatly missed, as he stepped down in early May 2017.

We welcomed Jason Gowie and Catherine Dubé to the Board of Directors in May 2017, both of whom bring a wide range of skills and experience to the Board. Catherine will Chair our Risk Committee and Jason will Chair our Marketing and Communications Committee.

As has been reported previously, the School has developed a strong and clearly focused strategic plan for the next three years. Our various committees, the community and the Board have a role to play in the implementation and execution of that strategy. Work is progressing across the initiatives identified for 2017 and we look forward to the achievement of our goals and the realisation of the benefits these will bring to the education and care of our students in the School. Our vision for our girls is that 'Sacré Cœur Women Shape the World' – all our energies are committed to supporting that vision as we face our future with purpose and confidence.

Focus Goal 2017

Living A Deep Respect for Intellectual Values

Each year, one of the five Goals of Sacred Heart Education is selected for special emphasis throughout that year. This goal is referred to as the annual Focus Goal. In 2017, the Focus Goal is A Deep Respect for Intellectual Values.

Our Foundress, St Madeleine Sophie Barat, started Sacred Heart schools over 200 years ago. From the beginning she stated that Sacred Heart schools must be places where studies are serious and strong. As the years have progressed other characteristics of the learning culture of Sacred Heart schools have emerged.

They are places where:

- students are respected and supported as individuals
- the focus is upon educating the whole person

- students and staff are considered partners in learning
- students are encouraged to take responsibility for their learning
- the community fosters a love of learning and a life-long commitment to learning
- there is a commitment to 'best practice' in curriculum development and delivery
- there is an engagement in being an active participant as a global citizen

What does this mean for each student? It calls them to be a person who:



- treats her approach to learning seriously
- strives to do her best
- tries different things and learns from her mistakes
- acknowledges that learning involves experiences within and beyond the classroom, and
- is supportive in helping others to learn.

125th Anniversary Goals of Sacred Heart Education Mural: A Deep Respect for Intellectual Values Panel

The 125th Anniversary Mural dedicated a panel to each of the Goals. In the Deep Respect for Intellectual Values panel the students' respect is represented in their holding of books. The titles of these books are embossed onto their covers and spines: The two books, the Plan of Studies and the Heart of Our God, are foundational texts of Sacred Heart Education. The original Plan of Studies book was written in 1804 and was a curriculum guide for teachers in Sacred Heart Schools. For the next 150 years this document provided the basis upon which curriculum in schools throughout the world were grounded. The other book, Heart of our God, provides the documentary sources for the current five Goals of Sacred Heart Education which is a modern interpretation and expression of the original Plan of Studies. The common theme in both these documents is the high value placed on the education of the whole individual.

A central aspect of this holistic approach in Sacred Heart Education is the importance placed on the spiritual development of the individual, providing students with the opportunity to come to know the love of God in their lives. For the RSCJ, an important vehicle for knowing and experiencing the love of God is through the Eucharist – the Mass. As proclaimed by our foundress, St Madeleine Sophie Barat, The fruit of communion and participation in the Eucharist is that the Lord becomes one with us, and we become one with him.

So, the second key element of this panel is two symbols of the Eucharist Mass – the chalice situated at the feet of the children, and the host located at the top of the panel. The host has been fashioned from mirrored tiles to represent the presence of God in the consecrated host. We then see God being reflected in our mirror self-image.


The Year 12 Class of 2016 achieved the following:


- Our Dux Claudia Thomas, achieved an ATAR of 99.75.

- Our median ATAR was 87.68
- 7% of students received ATAR scores of equal to or above 99 (3.9% in 2015)

- 39.5% of students received ATAR scores over 90 (36.8% in 2015)
- 54.7% of students received ATAR scores over 85 (52.6% in 2015)
- 64% of students received ATAR scores over 80 (59.2% in 2015)

Sacré Cœur was the second highest achieving Victorian Catholic School in 2016.

We are immensely proud of the results of the Year 12 Class of 2016 at an individual and collective level. The Class of 2016 worked well with their dedicated teachers to achieve their best. They also contributed so much to our community over their final year to ensure it was a very memorable one for all. 27% of Sacré Coeur students achieved a study score of 40 or more.

Our view of A Deep Respect for Intellectual Values

For students, every day at Sacré Cœur is an invitation to be involved. Our Sacred Heart Goals guide us, and this year's Focus Goal – A Deep Respect for Intellectual Values – is a signpost, something that shows us the way to opportunities and possibilities that are there for all of us. A deep respect for intellectual values means many things but, to the students, it means challenging our imaginations, our ethics and our values, pursuing personal intellectual development and, perhaps most of all, encouraging and supporting a love of learning.

Intellectual Values are not just academic. Sacré Cœur offers a whole raft of activities that grow and encourage its students. From the thriving arts, photography and design subjects whose products adorn the walls of the studios, to the energy and excitement of the House Arts Festival productions and drama classes. There are also the school plays, the concerts and the fabulous music programs that can be heard as you move around the school on any day. We also learn to question and challenge, whether it be in the debating or public speaking teams or in our daily engagement in every class.

Encouraging and supporting a love of learning though is perhaps the most important, and it means far more than simply getting your Science and French homework done! Most of all it means celebrating learning and the gaining of knowledge, which is fostered through the culture of Sacré Cœur. This is a school that says putting time into your study, working actively with your fellow students and teachers to understand the work and achieving academic goals, is important. Such a culture is encouraged by the teachers and leadership of the school but, even more significantly, is something that comes from the girls themselves. The culture exists within the student body and is nurtured and taken on again as each year level moves into and through the school.

Our love of learning and pursuit of knowledge is not something confined to the classroom, but is embraced and encouraged within the whole school body. We celebrate our involvement in school sport but we equally celebrate being in science competitions, maths workshops, public speaking events and

An education that enhances potential is even more valuable than one that seeks to meet it.

Working with young people and being in their midst on a daily basis is indeed an enormous privilege. This privilege is enhanced all the more by the knowledge that the potential of each child is not a fixed state, but something that can grow through experience and encounter. The work of Dr Carol Dweck in developing Growth Mindset philosophy is particularly empowering for learners, whether we be students at school or students of life.

A growth mindset is based in the belief that qualities (skills, attitudes and knowledge) can be cultivated through effort. In a nutshell, a growth mindset is marked by a passion for learning. This drive sees one seek input to process into constructive action. Such a mindset is amongst the greatest dispositions one can possess as it directly impacts one's capacity to learn.

Janet Erskine Stuart RSCJ wrote of Sacred Heart Education being not about turning children out small and finished, but seriously begun on a wide-basis. Whilst we go about teaching knowledge and skills to our students, it is equally, if not more valuable, to be seeking to enhance their capacity to learn. To do this is to enhance their potential. When we speak to the students about mindset, effort and attitude, we are addressing in one of the most powerful ways our Sacred Heart

Connect Us

The Connect Us program is a whole school initiative that runs for the first three days of the school year. The aim of the program is for everyone in the year level to get to know each other better, including getting to know teachers. Each class completes different activities with a focus on helping, respecting and appreciating one another.

One of the Year 6 activities was to create a Me Box. A Me Box is where you put different objects about yourself into a container. In Year 5, both classes took responsibility in learning about online safety in a digital citizen lesson. Year 5 students wrote their name, values and qualities that they wanted known about themselves. In Year 4 the students focused on the benefits of meditation. The Year 3 class wrote a portrait poem. A portrait poem is a way of drawing yourself with words. Within the Prep, Year 1 and Year

From the Director of Learning and Teaching

"The best education, the most solid instruction according to our time and the country where we are, but always essentially based on our principles, that is what our Holy Mother would have desired if she had been called to found a house here...it is not for us to do what our fathers did, but do what our fathers would do if they were here, not as our Holy Mother did in her time, but as she would do here, today, must be our guide." - Janet Erskine Stuart

Our 2017 focus goal of A Deep Respect for Intellectual Values is integral to our identity as a Sacred Heart school rooted in the philosophies of St Madeleine Sophie Barat, Janet Erskine Stuart and all who have followed them. Intellectual values, which include the commitment to the gaining of knowledge, discernment about what is right and true and then acting on that knowledge in a way that benefits the whole of society, support young people to live worthwhile, meaningful and satisfying lives. The atmosphere that promotes the deep respect for this way of living is the gift of our school. The ability to focus more fully on an individual goal each year deepens our understanding and commitment to all five goals.

In 2017 we have committed to a focus on the craft and science of teaching, the pedagogy, to ensure our young women are taught in a way that is contemporary and equips them for the rapidly changing and globally connected world. The Learning and Teaching Committee, which is made up of all Heads of Faculty, the Digital Learning and Innovation Leader, the Head of Notre Monde, the Head of Library and Information Services as well the Assistant Head of Joigny and the Careers Counsellor have a number of projects that have been undertaken in 2017. A snapshot of these projects follows:

An agreed understanding of contemporary learning and what and is required to ensure our vision, articulated in the 2017 - 2020 Strategic Plan, that Sacré Cœur Women Shape the World. Amongst other qualities required by these young women will be the ability to cross borders and be globally active citizens. This project is led by myself, with a working party consisting of members of the Learning and Teaching Committee alongside representatives of the Wellbeing and Faith and Mission teams.

As we consider the global lives our students will lead we look to restructure our language offerings for 2018 and beyond. We will be implementing a Prep - Year 10 French stream to better suit our students who begin their Sacred Heart education in Joigny. This will run alongside French from Years 5 - 10, 7 - 10. All students will have the opportunity to maximise their language experience in this way. This will allow for smooth and flexible transition at all entry points. This project is being led by our Head of Languages in the secondary school, Debra Dunn and our Joigny French teacher, Brigit Keel, as well as all members of the secondary French faculty.

Digital Technologies is a new curriculum area in the Victorian Curriculum (Foundation [Prep] - 10) which is designed to have students from their earliest years become confident, creative and ethical digital users and developers. This curriculum is essential for students in our school to participate fully in their



futures and contribute to the world in a meaningful way. The implementation of this curriculum is being led by the Leader of Digital Learning and Innovation, Jade Jackson. She is supported in this work by a team of staff which includes our present teacher of Robotics and Digital Technologies as well as a number of Faculty heads, the Assistant Head of Joigny and the Head of Library and Information Services.

Our secondary Creative Arts faculty will be presenting the inaugural "Festival of Ideas" in 2017. This Festival of Ideas is a twice-yearly event where students showcase their learning from research and idea generation through to refinement, reflection and final product. This Festival of Ideas allows each student the opportunity to own their work and present it to the community in a real and meaningful way. This project is being led by the Faculty head of Creative Arts, Nhariah Tran, with all members of the Creative Arts Faculty, staff and students being involved.

Alongside these key projects for 2017 is our implementation of the Victorian Curriculum in its entirety, our commitment to the individual differences area of our school both in support and extension and a continued focus on the love of learning in our students through differentiated classrooms and growth mindsets.

A Resilient Mindset is Essential for Improved Learning Outcomes

In the Spirit and Plan of Studies in the Society of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, printed in 1958, are some clearly articulated educational principles, which aptly reflect our Sacred Heart Goal for this year The child is hope...[and] each child has a right to instruction appropriate to the capacity with which she is endowed...[furthermore] when dealing with the education of girls - the specific character of feminine psychology must be taken into consideration.

Renowned psychologist and educator, Steve Biddulph would no doubt concur with these principles when it comes to the education of young women, but he would also argue that, in our current world, some aspects of modern girlhood are stifling individual capacity. As a phase in a woman's life, modern girlhood is more lonely, pressured, unkind and busy than ever before, says Biddulph in his latest book, 10 Things Girls Need Most.

Over the years, some of the gains for young women as a result of the feminist era, which had laudable communal roots - looking out for one another - seem to have been whittled down. As with any social phenomenon, the factors are many and sometimes quite complex in nature. However, we know that advertising and social media have not always served young women well, adding pressure to 'be cool and amazing'; this pressure has also been exacerbated by the desire of well-meaning adults in the girls' lives for them to be successful.

But just as the research has laid bare, some of the findings around increased mental health issues for young women, with one in five in a classroom of 15 year old girls on anti-anxiety or anti-depressant medication, there is additional research which provides us with significant antidotes. Much of this research is in the area of resilience.

Amongst some of the most powerful tools which we ought to equip our young women with is resilience. International research of over 4 million young people shows there are 40 key predictors of wellbeing and resilience in young people. The key finding is that the more of these assets a person has, the more likely they are to:

- Achieve academic success
- Experience stable relationships
- Complete schooling
- Be persistent problem solvers
- Show constructive leadership

Professor Angela Duckworth, author of *Grit: The Power of Passion and Perseverance*, cites many examples of the power of grit or resilience in her book. An appealing anecdote shared in her book was the response given by Head Coach of the Seahawks, Super Bowl football champions, when asked what it means to be a Seahawk. He did not speak about



As a phase in a woman's life, modern girlhood is more lonely, pressured, unkind and busy than ever before.

Seahawk players having natural talent or giftedness rather he said that the team was made up of guys who really have grit. [They have] a mindset that they're always going to succeed, that they have got something to prove. They're resilient, they're not going to let setbacks hold them back. They're not going to be deterred... by challenges and hurdles and things...it's that attitude - we really refer to it as grit.

Whilst, in our classrooms and through our pastoral curriculum, we actively promote a growth mindset and we



foster attributes and skills which will result in resilience-building in our young women; this year, we have taken an additional step. We have applied to be part of and are fortunate in having been accepted, to undertake a Resilience Project in partnership with Stonnington Council, which will provide us with a comprehensive, scientifically-validated resilience profile of our student population. As such it is a powerful tool for informing purposeful and informed conversations, strategic planning and development of targeted curriculum.

As part of the project, our students will undertake a Resilience Survey. The Resilience Survey incorporates three scientifically validated, reliable and internationally accepted measures: The Developmental Assets Profile (DAP), The Children's Hope Scale and The General Health Questionnaire (GHQ12), along with a set of risk and protective behaviours questions, developed by Australian clinical psychologists. The data is de-identified, which means that individuals are not identified and individual schools are not identified.

In this way, our mission is to support our young women to develop a resilient mindset which will contribute to their ability to enjoy positive relationships, develop good mental health and have a strong motivation to learn. Ultimately, we want them to be able to celebrate all aspects of being a girl and to be equipped with the necessary tools to be able to confidently author their futures.

After experiencing our fair share of heartache in grand finals, this time lady luck was on our side in a thrilling 158 to 154 win. Two flags in three days is certainly the stuff of legend. Writer in Residence: Will Kostakis

Will Kostakis is an award-winning author of Young Adult fiction, his most notable titles being 'The First Third' and 'The Sidekicks'. His titles have been nominated for numerous awards including The Children's Book Council and the Ethel Turner Prize for Young People's Literature.

"Hands up if you'd heard of me before this week." [awkward giggles and chatter as only a few hands are raised]

[laughs] "This is perfect! You're giving me the chance to give you the best impression possible!"

And what an impression he gave! Upon the completion of his Writer in Residency, from 7 to 10 March, Will Kostakis had amassed a legion of new fans, all impressed by the candour, experience and expertise he was able to share.

Will Kostakis, an award-winning author of Young Adult fiction, spent the week conducting a series of creative writing workshops with girls in Years 9 and 10. Here they were able to consolidate their understanding and skills of the precision of language, evocative storytelling and character development. Year 12 students were also guided in how to approach their upcoming Reading and Creating SAC.

In a series of whole-level presentations from Years 9 to 12, the students were invited into Will's hilarious tales of his family, his schooling and how he came about earning his first book deal, at the age of 17 years. This served as inspiration to many students, with a number of girls sharing their writing with Will, seeking mentorship which he obliged readily.

Staff also had the privilege of hearing Will deliver a keynote address during a staff luncheon on the Thursday of his residency. Here, intertwined with his trademark humour, Will opened up on a topic on which he feels very passionate: the importance of fostering inclusive and affirming learning environments for our students; spaces where a student's identity is validated. Will's moving presentation provoked much thought and discussion amongst the staff who were present and will, no doubt, resonate well beyond his visit.

Will's Residency closed with a book signing on the Friday, where laughter and rich conversation could be heard all through the Library. This, as well as the sustained discussion and practice of the strategies he imparted, is testament to Will having certainly created 'the best impression possible.'

A Visit to Sophie's Farm

I am the mother of a current Year 11 student and I had the pleasure of visiting Sophie's Farm, the RSCJ community in the Philippines, in 2016. During my stay I participated in community life while assisting the village women with cooking, weaving and sewing skills. From the Sacré Cœur Archives Building on our Foundations


The new car park under the tennis courts at the front of the School is the latest in a long line of building works at Sacré Cœur. Increasing numbers of students, developments in education, changing architectural fashions and societal shifts have all contributed to the many additions to buildings and facilities.


In August 1888 students and RSCJ Sisters were housed in just one building -Brynmawr. Michael Keeley originally built this as a family home in 1859, comprising eight rooms and two storeys. Subsequent owners added to the property so that by the time of its purchase by the RSCJ Sisters it had been extended with a billiard room and a small wing. It is thought that Robert Morgan, who purchased the house in 1868, named it 'Brynmawr'. Morgan was Welsh and the name Brynmawr means 'high hill'. At the time of the School's opening, the surrounding area was still largely rural. A student writing in the 1890s said This part of Malvern was little inhabited in the nineties. All around us were fields. In fact, cows and a horse grazed in the School grounds, chickens were kept in the fowl house and the Sisters tended a kitchen garden that supplied much of their produce.


Construction of the red brick building, which began in 1890, marked the first of many more buildings to be built, refurbished or extended. Today many architectural styles can be seen at Burke Road, reflecting the time of construction. These range from Keeley's Victorian lacework on Brynmawr to the 1960s/1970s Florence Buckley Hall, from the French Gothic revival style of the red brick, to the contemporary Janet Erskine Stuart Centre.

In 2017 we can enjoy and utilise facilities old and new at Sacré Cœur – they mark our journey from the beginnings of Sacred Heart education at Burke Road. What memories and stories are bound up within them! Although the buildings may change, the vision of Saint Madeleine Sophie Barat remains, reflected in the spirit of Cor Unum.

The purpose of the Janet Stuart
Bursary Fund is to provide bursaries
for the benefit of daughters or
granddaughters of alumnae of
Sacred Heart Schools who would
not otherwise be able to attend
Sacré Cœur.

Bursaries are granted for secondary education and only one child per family is eligible to receive a bursary.

School enrolment procedures must be completed prior to applying for a bursary.

Applications must be submitted before 31 January, TWO years prior to the intended commencement at Sacré Cœur in order for the Trustees of the Fund to consider whether the criteria are met. Applicants will be notified, by April of the same year, of the outcome of their application.

As a guide, the bursary would normally cover approximately 25% of tuition fees. A bursary is granted for the remainder of the child's education at Sacré Cœur as long as the parents' needs require. The bursary is subject to an annual financial review.

The Janet Stuart Bursary was an initiative of the Sacré Cœur Alumnae Association some fifty years ago and is still funded by the Association. The bursary is administered by the Trustees of the Janet Stuart Bursary Fund. The Trustees are appointed in accordance with the Trust Deed of the Fund and operate independently of the Sacré Cœur Alumnae Association.
